Commissioner Gross, D.A. Rollins address residents at National Night Out celebration

At last Tuesday evening's annual National Night Out at LoPresti Park Mayor Martin Walsh joined the city's law enforcement agencies' top brass and met with residents to discuss issues in the neighborhood and to open a continued dialogue with the community.

At the event Walsh pointed out the decrease in crime both in East Boston and across the city before turning the microphone over to Boston Police Commissioner William Gross.

Gross, who began his career in Eastie in 1985, said every time he comes to the community whether for a peace walk, a ribbon-cutting or other events he feels like he's back home.

Gross then thanked the community for their continued partnership with the Boston Police to keep crime down in the neighborhood.

"You heard the mayor talk about all the great stats and some things we need to work on," said Gross. "We just want to educate you that when we

mention the positive things that means you are a part of it. We couldn't do it without the community's help. When we talk about community policing everyone counts everyone wants a great quality of life so we are working in partnership with you to make sure that that happens."

Gross said Eastie is very strong, but no matter what neighborhood you are from you are a resident of Boston.

"You are part of the city and we vow to protect you," he said.

Gross said while National Night Out is an opportunity to bridge the gap that sometimes exists between police and residents this gap is virtually non-existent in the community. Gross said through police walking the beat and interacting with residents daily, community policing efforts, the police's Youth Activities League and weekly Peace Walks the community and the police are one.

"National Night Out is not

31st Annual Eastie Pride Day to kickoff Saturday at Piers Park

It's that time of year to break out your blue-and-gold attire and head down to Piers Park for the 31st Annual Eastie Pride Day.

This year's Eastie Pride Day will kick off on Saturday, August 17 at 3 p.m. at the park. The forecast for Saturday is warm with temperatures in the high 70s--making it a perfect day to celebrate the neighborhood's community spirit, talent and diverse cultures.

In 1988 former Boston City Councilor Sal LaMattina was a staffer for former Boston Mayor Raymond Flynn.

Flynn had an idea--summer block parties and community celebrations in every Boston neighborhood to bring residents closer together.

LaMattina was tasked with coming up with community-wide celebration in Eastie. He and his wife Lisa just got married the year before, and at the time a lot of the friends they grew up with were moving to Saugus, Peabody, or Revere.

"One night Lisa and I were talking about the future and whether or not we should move, but Lisa said we should stay and take care of East Boston," said LaMattina. "I'll

Jeffries Point Neighborhood Association approves Sumner Street project

The Jeffries Point Neighborhood Association (JPNA) voted 14-2 in favor of a four-unit condo project at 464 Sumner St. at the group's August meeting on Monday night.

Attorney for the project, Matt Eckel, said that after negotiations with abutters and the JPNA's Planning and Zoning Subcommittee his client made several changes to the project to address some of the neighbor's concerns.

"The project is to change the occupancy from a three-family residential dwelling to a four-family residential condominium dwelling," said Eckel.

Aside from changing the occupancy, Eckel said his client would renovate the facade of the building to give it a more historic look, as well as

add a rear addition.

The original proposal presented to JPNA members included adding a fourth story to the building.

"After discussions with neighbors at the last JPNA Planning and Zoning Subcommittee meeting we have eliminated the fourth floor, but will add the additional fourth unit into the basement of the building," said Eckel.

With the fourth floor eliminated Eckel said his client also agreed to reduce the rear addition from 22 feet to 14 feet, increase the rear setbacks from 33 feet to 41 feet, increase open space to 1,021 square feet and reduce the overall size of the units by 150 square feet.

All the changes made the building more compliant and reduced the number of violations under the Boston Zoning

Code.

The project now only needs variances for Use because it is changing from a three to a four family, Additional Lot Area, Floor Area Ratio, Open Space, Side Yard, Front Yard

and Parking. However, Eckel pointed out that the Floor Area Ratio, Side Yard, Front Yard and Parking were all pre-existing and only triggered as a violation because of the plan to add a fourth unit.

Suspect arrested for a string of commercial robberies

Boston Police believe they have caught the suspect sought in a string of commercial robberies in East Boston over the past few weeks.

On Aug. 4, Boston Police executed a search warrant in Everett and seized evidence that may connect William Seabaugh to several commercial break-ins at Renegades, Luna Restaurant and other establishments in Orient Heights Square.

Police informed Seabaugh

that he was the target of a police investigation in connection with the commercial robberies and towed away his black pickup truck. He was taken into custody for questioning, according to police.

Video surveillance captured a black pickup truck leaving the scene of some of the robberies. Video surveillance from cameras in and around Orient Heights Square also captured images of the suspect. Police believe Seabaugh

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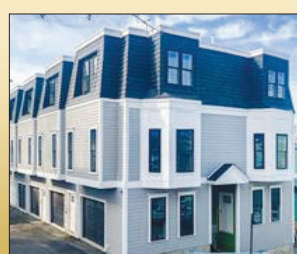


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EAST BOSTON FARMERS MARKET GOING STRONG

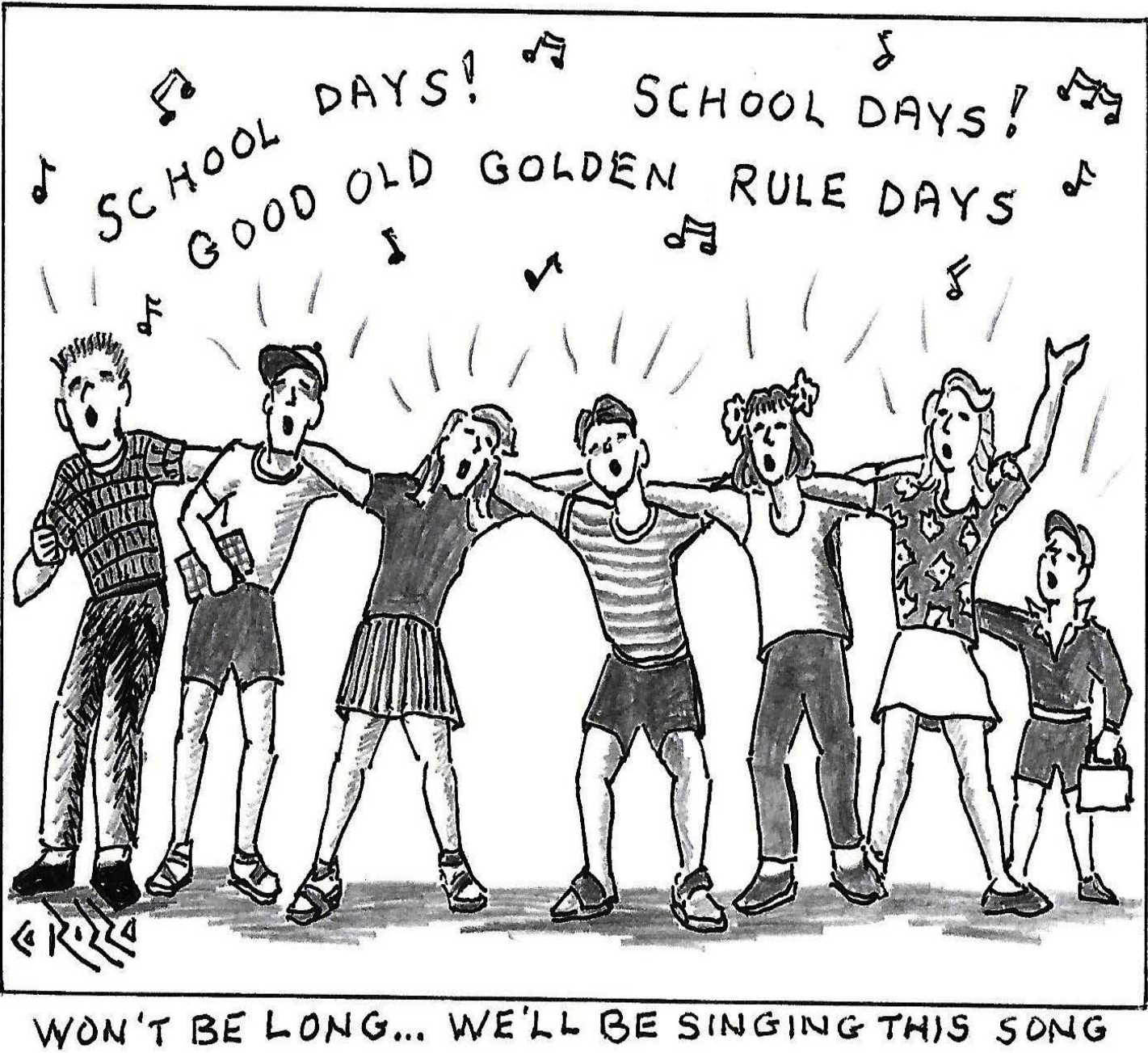

Massport gears up for five years of construction; local environmentalist watchdog group not happy

Imagine your neighbor decides to do some work on their house. They want to build an addition, go up three stories to add more rental units, change their heating system, put in a pool, build a new driveway and add five more parking spaces.

Don’t you think that you as a neighbor and your other neighbors would deserve an opportunity to weigh in on this?

However, what if the building department decided that each of these jobs individually wasn’t that big a deal and didn’t amount to much and so they just gave them the permits, and didn’t require your neighbor to take his project to the Zoning Board of Appeals so they just started the work? You wouldn’t have any way to put the brakes on the work.

That’s what’s happening at Logan Airport

Massport last week announced a ‘communication plan’ to inform passengers, employees and tenants about an upcoming series of construction projects at Logan Airport.

“The projects will have major impacts to the traveling public, including roadway detours starting this fall, and will all be completed within the next five years,” wrote Massport in a press release.

Massport is preparing New England’s gateway airport for a growing number of passengers driven by the robust economy and industry trends. Massport is branding this campaign “Logan Forward,” complete with a new

website and a text-alert program coming later this fall to keep the public informed as we make important investments to improve the customer experience at Logan. In addition, Massport is training airport staff, and will use radio, print and digital advertising to get the word out to our passengers. There will also be signage throughout the airport terminals and along the roadways. Logan served 40.9 million passengers in 2018, and has nearly 20,000 full and part-time employees.

Massport’s \$2 billion capital plan includes Terminal B to C roadway improvements; a new Terminal B-C post-security connection; and new gates and a 2,000-space parking garage at Terminal E.

“‘Logan Forward’ is our commitment to improve the passenger experience and we pledge to keep the public informed every step of the way throughout the construction process so they can appropriately plan ahead,” said incoming Massport CEO Lisa Wieland. “This will be a long process and communication with our passengers will be key.”

However, local environmentalists are seeing “Logan Forward” as catchy name that has been thought up by Massport officials to spin a massive airport expansion strategy that has never been exposed to the light of day.

The Massachusetts General Law, chapter 30, section 61 establishes the state’s authority to regulate environmental impacts of airport projects through the Massachusetts Environmental Policy Act

(MEPA) review conducted by the Executive Office of Environmental Affairs (EOEA).

Since negative environmental impacts like air pollution, traffic congestion and airport noise accumulate incrementally, this law specifically requires the Massachusetts Executive Office of Environmental Affairs (EOEA) to consider projects in their entirety. But this system of procedural checks and balances only works if the state wants it to work. And despite the fact that the sum of the recent, current, and upcoming projects at Logan amounts to a multi-billion dollar expansion project over a 15-year ramp-up, MEPA has refused to consider this for what it is—a Mega Logan Expansion Project.

“This unregulated Mega Expansion has been going for 10 years already -starting around 2009 with the Consolidated Rental Car Facility (CONRAC), and will apparently go for another five years, according to Massport,” said AIR, Inc. in a statement. “Over this same 10-year period, Logan’s passenger volumes have shot up 64 percent. In this same time period, flights have increased by 23 percent, nighttime flights are off the charts, traffic congestion in the Sumner Tunnel is up 65 percent, and VOC, nitrous oxides, and particulate air pollution have risen with flight, as much as 24 percent. And there’s apparently no end in sight.”

According to the World Health Organisation (WHO), toxic air is now the biggest environmental risk of early

death, responsible for one in nine of all fatalities, killing 7 million people a year--more than HIV, tuberculosis and malaria combined.

“The WHO considers air pollution a global public health emergency,” said AIR, Inc. “But it’s no big deal in Boston.”

AIR, Inc. has now sent two email requests over the past two months to MEPA, the state regulators at the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), requesting to meet with Kathleen Theoharides, the incoming Secretary of EOEA appointed by Gov. Baker in April and haven’t received a reply.

“AIR, Inc. has not been consulted by Massport about Logan Forward,” read AIR, Inc.’s statement. “But we’d advise our neighbors that this is just a plan for the next five years. When they’re done with the Terminal B to C roadway improvements, a new Terminal B-C post-security connection, new gates and a 2,000-space parking garage at Terminal E, and a slew of other airport expansion projects in five years, that’ll bring airport from the 44 million passenger estimated 2019 level, up to about 65 million at current growth rates, they’ll find another five years worth of work to do, to bring us to 80 million.”

AIR, Inc. believes this will mean endless increases in traffic, noise and pollution for Eastie residents.

A new website, www.LoganForward.com, has been set up to provide more information about each of these projects, as well as construction timelines and updates. A new text alert program is also in the works and will be available later this fall. Passengers, employees and tenants will be able to get up-to-date messages about road detours and traffic impacts.

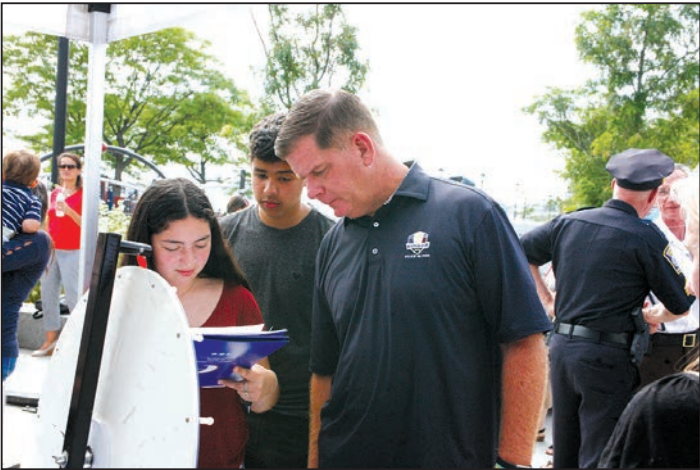



COUNCIL RECEIVES RFP FOR BUILDING

CHELSEA -City Manager Tom Ambrosino has forwarded a draft Request for Proposals (RFP) to the City Council for review and possible approval when the body reconvenes in late summer.

The Salvation Army building was taken by the City after it went vacant and seemingly had not viable plans. It is a key property in the City’s hopes to revitalize the downtown, and the RFP from Ambrosino has been long in the coming.

Now, the bones of that five-page RFP have become public and the vision is a mixed-use, affordable housing project with a retail component. Ambrosino has suggested that the City apply for zoning relief to build 16 units on top of the existing store. That, he suggested, would reduce the cost for any developer that wins designation for the site.

“I’m happy we are making some progress, and I hope to have an RFP ready for advertisement in the Fall,” he said.

The RFP explains that on the first floor, “the City envisions retail space that enlivens the streetscape, offers opportunities for small, locally owned businesses and entrepreneurs, and yields community benefits.”

The City is hoping that there could be new construction on top of the existing one-story store, with an affordable housing or mixed-income approach. The RFP encourages developers to be creating in helping to solve the City’s housing shortage and also bring life to what has been a troubled area for a long time.

“Projects shall aspire to increase the social and economic vitality of the central business district,” read the RFP. “Searching for an innovative, exciting project, the City desires an architecturally attractive and lively project that will result in positive, cascading effects throughout the central

business district, while providing an inviting and alluring atmosphere for residents and the community.”

The RFP calls for a robust community process from any developer that wins the right to develop the property.

Also, the sale price has been suggested to be somewhere around \$1.34 million, which was the appraised value in 2017.

An exciting process to complement the downtown initiatives are expected this fall.

BACK TO SCHOOL CELEBRATION PLANNED

When Yolanda Valles, parent liaison at the Mary C. Burke Elementary Complex, announces the date of Chelsea’s annual Back to School Celebration.

All Chelsea students and their families are invited to the celebration, which is free of charge. There will be amusements, including bouncy houses, face painting, hula hoops, and slime making. Also on tap are a disc jockey and live musical performances.

Dr. Mary Bourque, superintendent of Chelsea public schools, will be attendance, as will administrators and teachers from all the local schools.

The event annually draws a tremendous crowd. Chelsea’s, Pollo Campero, and Kayem will be providing food for all the guests.

Assisting Valles in the coordination of the event are Krishell Orellana, ELC parent liaison, Marlene Garcia, middle schools parent liaison, Daniel Mojica, parent information center director,

ZBA APPROVES SPECIAL PERMIT

EVERETT - The local Seventh Day Adventist Church could soon have a new home on Vernal Street.

Last week, the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) approved a special permit allowing the church to add a first-floor addition and a partial second floor to the existing building at 18 Vernal St.

“The second story will be over the right side of the building and will be strictly for administrative space,” said attorney Andrew Delory, who represented the church.

Delory said the additions will be an upgrade for the building and the neighborhood, and provide a new home for the Seventh Day Adventist’s approximately 60 active parishioners.

Until a year ago, the building at 18 Vernal St. was a functioning church, but Delory said that due to wear and tear, it was not the most aesthetically pleasing site. The proposed renovations also include new windows, a small steeple, and a handicap accessible entrance.

“The applicant’s intent is to fit into the neighborhood, not overtake it,” said Delory.

Several parishioners asked the ZBA to grant the special permit allowing for the additions, stating the improved building would provide a home for the church and allow them to better support their church and the community.

“We are trying to make a home for our future, and we are looking to open up more to the community and reach our young people,” said Elden Lainez, who has been a member of the church since 2001.

The ZBA unanimously approved the special permit, although member Joseph DeSisto did have some questions about parking on the site.

Delory noted that while parking did not fall under the purview of the ZBA granting the special permit, the applicants have been looking at ways to ease parking concerns near the church.

In other business, the ZBA granted a variance that will allow the Short Path Distillery on Kelvin Street to apply for an entertainment license.

Jackson Hewlett, one of the distillery’s founders, said he is looking for the ability to play recorded music and have a television at the craft cocktail tasting room.

The ZBA also granted a variance allowing a single-family house on Winthrop Street to be converted back to a two-family home, and granted a variance allowing for an

addition and garage at a house on Rock Valley Avenue.

The meeting was also the first with Mary Gerace chairing the board, as former chair DeSisto and member Richard Zullo served their last meeting as board members.

WHITSONS TO REPLACE ARAMARK IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

EVERETT - On Aug. 1, the Everett School Committee held a special meeting to discuss a major change in the Everett Public Schools (EPS), the end of a 26-year relationship with school cafeteria food and staff provider Aramark.

In attendance were School Committee members: Chair Thomas Abruzzese, Marcony Almeida-Barros, Millie Cardello, David Ela, Joseph LaMonica and Frank Parker, who also chairs the Subcommittee on Cafeterias.

For nearly three decades, EPS contracted with Aramark to provide cafeteria food and workers to the district. Now a new company, Whitsons Culinary Group, is taking over.

EPS first entered into a contract with Aramark 26 years ago. The contract had been extended several times. Having exhausted their rollover years, the district was required by law to put out a public bid for new contracts. Aramark and Whitsons both responded to these bids in June, with Whitsons coming out on top.

Aramark’s contract officially expired on August 1 after a series of 30-day extensions.

“The relationship with Aramark has been very strong,” said Parker to Independent. “But because of the laws, we had to go out and rebid the contract.”

School Committee members evaluated the companies’ bids based on a rubric of 10 criteria in the categories of meals, customer service and experience, and program management. Whitsons scored a

57 out of 70 possible points, while Aramark came in just under that at 55 out of 70.

Whitsons is a family-owned business founded in 1979 and based in Long Island, N.Y. With more than 3,000 employees, their mission is “enhancing life one meal at a time.”

Specific language written into the contract with Whitsons guarantees that the cafeteria workers who were previously employed by Aramark can continue in their positions if they so choose. The language preserves workers’ school locations, job titles, salaries and benefits.

Parker admitted that he understood how the change could be difficult for some people to stomach.

“It’s been a hectic year for the schools,” he said. “The last thing everyone wanted to change was the food service, because it wasn’t broken.”

But Parker wants the public to know that the Subcommittee on Cafeterias, which also includes School Committee members David Ela and Allen Panarese, will be fully involved in the transition from Aramark to Whitsons.

“Both [Ela and Panarese] have been in healthcare for over 40 years,” Parker said. “They understand the importance of good nutrition and they’re more than capable to aid in this transition.”

Whitsons is currently meeting with Aramark cafeteria workers and inviting them to meetings with its HR department and transition team.

“We’re going to make sure the employees are reached out to, feel secure and have stability in their jobs moving forward,” said Parker.

City Councilor Michael McLaughlin, who was in attendance at the meeting, expressed his disappointment with the end of the Aramark contract.

“It was sad seeing a company that has been in our community 20 years mistreated,” he told Independent. “I believe that this issue was much larger than the school lunch program.”

Aramark had the contract in place under the former Supt. Fred Foresteire, who resigned under a cloud of allegations of misconduct last year and has been criminally charged in Malden District Court (His last appearance was on Thursday, Aug. 8). Some have suggested that the Aramark contract was just another cog in the Foresteire machinery, which the City is now trying to distance itself from.

The councilor wanted assurance that Whitsons would “provide the same high-quality [meals] to the students as they received with Aramark.”

STILL REPAIRING DAMAGES BY DAMAGE

REVERE - Five years after Revere’s infamous tornado on the morning of July 28, 2014, the city is still making repairs. The EF-2 tornado had estimated peak winds of 100 to 120 mph. It cut a two-mile path in the Broadway area. A tree went through the high school, lines were down everywhere and streets were impassable. Many buildings were damaged, including ones owned by the city.

Overseeing all the tornado-related repairs is George Anzuoni, director of finance for the city. For the past five years Anzuoni and a small tornado committee have dealt with the insurance companies, contractors, piles of paperwork and more.

Anzuoni predicts it will take another year or two to make things right. The work has taken this long purely because of the process that the city had to go through. Compiling data and having the right paperwork took time to be done right.

“We documented every bit of damage,” he said.

At City Hall, the roof, which some say was lifted by the wind, was repaired at a cost of \$1.3 million. The cupola and the clock tower were repaired. The clock is now an atomic clock, which sets itself and is accurate. At night the clock tower faces light up.

The City Hall project also included installing copper downspouts and new gutters.

“This gave us a chance to do a complete roof,” Anzuoni said.

Another area in City Hall that still has to repair is on the second floor where water leaked into the Council Chambers, the auditorium, and some smaller south-facing areas around windows. Since the walls are plaster they have to be scraped down and re-plastered properly.

“The storm’s full force hit the south side of the building. That’s how we knew the storm was coming,” Anzuoni said.

A number of offices on the second floor were also damaged. The second-floor damaged is being assessed by the city and its insurance companies at this time. Anzuoni said there may be other renovations in City Hall and some moving around of offices.

“The building shook,” he said. “It caused some problems with pipes and sewer lines. We’ve taken care of all that.”

In addition to City Hall, there were many other tornado-damaged repairs to municipal buildings.

“We’ve done a number of roofs,” he said. “We took care of City Hall last because the schools were most important.”

A new roof at the high school, another new roof at the senior center, the American Legion building, the central fire station and the Parks and Recreation roof.

All total, Anzuoni believes the final cost will be about \$6 million, all from insurance money.

“With the launch of our new and improved Revere.org, and today with Mobile City Hall, we’re continuing to modernize and professionalize the way our residents can interact with their city government,” Mayor Arrigo said. “Revere residents deserve the very best in city services and we’re proud to now bring them directly to their neighborhoods and doorsteps.”

Bioran/Quest Diagnostics employee

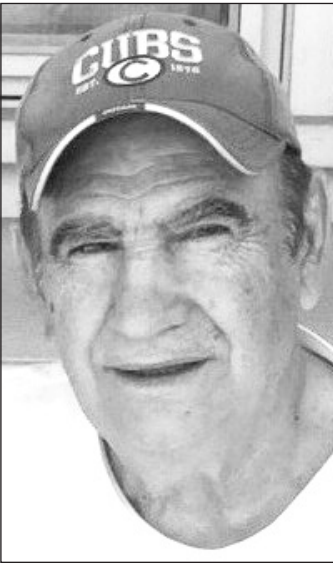

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
