

As part of its ongoing work to ensure the state's 81 waterfronts are safe and welcoming to everyone, the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) has partnered with Save the Harbor/Save the Bay and the Metropolitan Beaches Commission (MBC) to roll out new multilingual signage at agency beaches across the state.

Visitors to DCR's inland and coastal beaches

will be greeted in nine different languages: Spanish, Portuguese, Vietnamese, Haitian Creole, Mandarin, Traditional Chinese, Cape Verdean Creole, Russian and Arabic. DCR has added new "welcome" decals to visitor signs to the state's 15 metropolitan beaches - Pleasure Bay, City Point, Nantasket, M Street, Carson, Revere, Short, Constitution, Winthrop, Nahant, Wollaston, Savin Hill, Malibu,

HURRICANE BERYL: A HARBINGER OF THINGS TO COME?

By now we've all become aware of Hurricane Beryl, which left a trail of death and destruction in its wake during the past week stretching from the Southern Caribbean to Texas as it set records for the strongest-ever hurricane -- a Category 5 -- this early in the season. Hurricane forecasters in April issued a forecast for an extremely active hurricane season and Beryl's record-setting run appears to be only a prelude to what may be in store for those of us who live along the coast in the coming months.

As we have noted in the past, there is no escape anywhere in the world from the effects of climate change. We can only hope that our little corner of the globe will luck out for another year and we'll escape the wrath of the worst that Mother Nature can throw at us.

Medicare Savings Program, Property Tax Workoff and City Savings for Older Adults

I'm excited to let you know about two important programs that help our older residents save more money:

The first is the Medicare Savings Program (MSP)—which now offers more savings to more residents. Thanks to changes that went into effect earlier this year, assets are no longer counted against your eligibility for this program, eliminating a major barrier for access. And, on top of that, the amount of money you could save on Medicare-related costs like premiums, copays, and prescriptions has increased as well-from \$2,500 a year to \$3,000.

The second program

I want to tell you about is Age Strong's Property Tax Workoff Program (PTWOP). The PTWOP invites Boston homeowners age 60 and older to volunteer with the City in order to work money off of their property taxes. PTWOP volunteers have the freedom to determine their own schedules and provide support to various City departments from the Boston Public Library and our senior centers, to the Disabilities Commission or the Office of Veterans Services. This year thanks to advocacy from AgeStrong and our partners in community—older adults can now earn\$2,000 off their property taxes up from \$1,500. Examples

of past PTWOP projects include helping children with school work at the Leahy Holloran Community Center, directing traffic at the annual Boston Americans with Disabilities Act event, and assisting with the distribution of free air-conditioning units to Boston families.

There are also a number of other savings available to Boston residents age 60 or older. Age Strong's trained advocates can help

The new signage, created in partnership with Save the Harbor/Save the Bay, is part of the agency's continued effort to promote access and inclusivity to its properties especially waterfronts in environmental justice communities. "As our summers get hotter, it's critical that all of our residents and families have access to and feel welcome at our waterfronts, and something as simple as signage goes a long way toward that," said DCR Commissioner Brian Arrigo. "We want everyone to be able to enjoy our beautiful beaches regardless of their spoken language. I'm thrilled with these new signs that welcome beachgoers and help ensure their safety."

"Multilingual signage at every beach was one of the top recommendations in the Metropolitan Beaches Commission's 2023 'Breaking Barriers' Report," said Save the Harbor Executive Director Chris Mancini. "We feel very lucky to have great partners in Commissioner Arrigo and his team at DCR who share our values and are willing to prioritize and complete a project like this in time for the beach season."

DCR is enhancing beach and pool safety by installing new, easier-to-understand signs outlining the rules for agency beaches and pools. These signs, available in English and Spanish, feature logos reminding beachgoers not to engage in certain activities for their safety, including not swimming outside of designated areas as well as not drinking alcohol or bringing dogs on the beach from April 1 through September 15. The beach rules signs will also be available in the eight other languages via a QR code on the sign. DCR is also updating its pool rules signs for the agency's 24 pools and the updated signs will be available at agency pools in English and Spanish and the eight other languages via a QR code.

DCR and Save the Harbor/Save the Bay are promoting the new multilingual signage in a video posted to DCR's social media accounts today.

Additionally, DCR has four existing water safety signs at its beaches - no swimming, no lifeguard on duty, ring buoys, and water quality - that can be translated into nine languages via a QR code. Last summer, the agency installed new shorebird protection panels at DCR beaches, explaining that beachgoers share beaches with piping plovers, which are also available in multiple languages via a OR code.

"The MBC's goal has always been to take an indepth look to improve our region's beaches," said MBC Co-Chair, Senator Brendan Crighton. "With more people than ever turning to our beaches for health, rest, fun and recreation, it's so important that we take steps to eliminate any barriers to access and equity in these public places."

"Equity, inclusion and diversity are critically important to me and my constituents in East Boston," said MBC Co-Chair, Rep. Adrian Madaro. "Save the Harbor's free programs have improved access for everyone, and being greeted in your native language

when you arrive is essential to reinforcing those feelings of ownership and belonging we should all have for these fantastic Lifeguards play a cru-

cial role in public safety at our state parks and beaches. This year, the agency also expanded its efforts to recruit and hire multilingual lifeguards and water safety staff to work at the agency's waterfronts and pools. This spring and summer, DCR ran recruitment PSAs for lifeguards and water safety staff on Spanish and Portuguese radio stations.

DCR is continuing to hire lifeguards at certain properties including Revere Beach, the Vietnam Veterans Pool in Chelsea, the Geisler Memorial Pool and the Lt. Colonel Edward J. Higgins Pool in Lawrence for the summer season. This year, the Healey-Driscoll Administration maintained the competitive hourly rate for lifeguards of \$22 an hour. Lifeguards can still earn up to \$750 in retention bonuses if they commit continuing to work for the department through the end of the season. To learn more about lifeguarding opportunities, please visit the agency's lifeguarding webpage.

DCR is committed to ensuring everyone can safely cool down at its beautiful waterfronts during the hot summer season. The agency opened its 81 waterfronts for the summer season on May 26, and last month, it expanded its lifeguard services to 32 designated swimming areas across the state from approximately 10:15 a.m. to 5:45 p.m. On June 22, DCR opened its 24 pools and two wading pools across the state for the summer season. DCR pools are open daily from 11:15 a.m. to 6:45 p.m. Wading pools open and close an hour earlier, and spray

decks are open from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Check DCR's Park Alerts page for any closures of swimming areas due to bacteria and the most up-to-date park hours.

Many DCR coastal and

inland beaches have beach wheelchairs and mobi mats that help provide access to the water for people of all abilities.

All DCR swimming pools have outdoor chair lifts to provide access to the water.

Several pools also have ramps into the water or offer zero-depth entry, and select pools and spray decks also have beach wheelchairs for use. DCR has prioritized

making its beaches accessible to people of all backgrounds, spoken languages, incomes and abilities. Each year, DCR and Save the Harbor/Save the Bay partner to provide thousands of dollars in grant funding to organizations focused on breaking down barriers for people of color, people who don't speak English and people with disabilities through the Better Beaches Partnership. This year, the Partnership granted more than \$315,000 to community and youth serving organizations.





This grant will bolster Project Bread's pivotal role in advancing the Northeast Regional Anti-Hunger Network (NERAHN), a coalition dedicated to eradicating hunger in the seven-state Northeast region. MBTA achieves historic labor agreements with entire workforce

The Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (MBTA) has reached a landmark achievement by successfully negotiating agreements with all 28 of its affiliated labor unions, representing 16 collective bargaining agreements. accomplishment, This the first of its kind since 2009, was realized within 18 months of the Healey-Driscoll Administration taking office and under the leadership of MBTA General Manager Phillip Eng.

"The success of the MBTA depends on a welltrained, motivated and empowered workforce. That's why, from day one, our administration has been committed to partnering with labor to efficiently secure agreements that ensure workers receive competitive wages and benefits and strengthen our efforts to recruit and retain the best talent. I'm grateful to General Manager Eng and his team for their leadership, to our labor unions for their partnership, and to the men and women who keep the T moving forward for their hard work," said Governor Maura Healey.

Healey proclaims 'Hurricane Preparedness Week' in Massachusetts

Healey signed a proclamation declaring the week of July 7 to July 13, 2024, as "Hurricane Preparedness Week," to emphasize the importance of planning and preparing for hurricanes and other tropical systems, which most often impact Massachusetts during the months of August and September.

During the week-long initiative, the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) will focus on hurricane preparedness messaging and offer informational resources to individuals and municipalities on what can be done before, during, and after a tropical system impacts Massachusetts to protect life and

"During Hurricane Preparedness Week, I urge all residents to take stock of their emergency supplies and to plan and prepare ahead of peak hurricane season," said Governor "Near-record warm ocean temperatures are expected to fuel more frequent and intense tropical storms, meaning there may be increased likelihood for us in Massachusetts to experience a hurricane."

Atlantic Hurricane Season runs from June 1 to November 30 each year. This year, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) forecasters at the Climate Prediction Center antic-

Tips for preparing your child now for back-to-school bullies

Many parents are already considering what they need to do to prepare their children for the new school year that is just around the corner. While what they will wear and do after school is essential, ensuring they know what to do about back-to-school bullies should be at the top of every parent's priority list. Bullies will head back to school as well, and they will be ready to start picking on kids from day one.

"Summer is a great time to get kids ready for the new school year, including with how to win against bullies," says Kirk Smalley, co-founder of Stand for the Silent. "Addressing it now will ensure the school year will be smooth and bully-free."

Over the summer, parents can do a lot to raise awareness about bullying in their home and community. Making it a priority may help reduce the incidents of bullying in school and in the community. Proactive communities can make people more

aware of the issue, which can help reduce the inci-

According to the National Institutes of Health, a few risk factors may make people more vulnerable to being bullied. These include a kid being seen as different from their peers, being seen as weak or unable to defend themselves, having low self-esteem, being less popular, not socializing well with others, and suffering from disabilities.

Here are tips for preparing kids now for back-toschool bullies:

Discuss bullying now. Discuss bullying, including what it is and what to do about it. Talk about the different types of bullying, how to address it, and what to do if they see someone else being bullied.

Role-play. Act out some bullying scenes with the kids so they can practice responding to them. This will help put them more at ease if the real situation ever comes up.

Get others involved.

Parents can start anti-bullying groups now, which will get more kids involved in helping to keep bullying out of the school. Kids can get together to discuss the issue and ways to respond.

Contact the school. Most schools have staff working over the summer. Contact the child's school to inquire about having an anti-bullying campaign kick off when school starts. Help them bring in a speaker, such as Stand for the Silent, and get together a group of kids for the anti-bullying task force.

Teach self-defense. It's never a good idea to encourage your child to fight, but there are some self-defense moves that they can learn to protect themselves should it get physical. Bullies tend to pick on those they feel won't stand up for themselves. Teach kids self-defense over the summer, such as enrolling them in karate. When kids are confident, they are more likely to stand up to a bully, and then the bully loses interest in that person.

"This school year, we are going to be rewarding students who help with anti-bullying at their school," added Smalley. "We want to encourage students to set the example and help create a kinder, more accepting school atmosphere." Stand for the Silent

is launching a program called Student Stand Out this school year. Teachers can nominate students who they feel stand out by being kind, addressing bullying, being a positive role model, having good leadership, having respect and integrity, and demonstrating actions that show initiative to end bullying at the school. Each week through the school year, one nominee will be chosen to receive a \$50 Visa gift card, and at the end of each semester, one person will be selected to win a \$100 gift card. The nomination period runs from August 1 to December 1 and then from January 1

Those interested in getting involved can start a chapter of the group in their area, obtain a free K-2 bullying prevention curriculum or cyberbullying handbook for parents, host a presentation at their school, introduce the How All Started video, and donate to help support the cause. Started in 2010, Stand for the Silent is an organization on a mission to help eliminate bullying nationwide. 

Boston's award-winning drinking water, noted that the focus on quality is imperative every step of the way from "the reservoir to the tap." In that spirit, he said, BWSC is continuing its aggressive campaign to remove all private lead service pipes remaining in Boston. "We want everyone in Boston to enjoy our high-quality drinking water safely," said Vitale. "If people have a lead pipe supplying water into their residence, suspect they have lead or are unsure, please call Boston Water and Sewer Commission right away."

Boston Mayor Michelle Wu has directed the Commission to provide both free inspections to determine if pipes are lead or not, and for the lead replacement program itself to be cost free. Boston property owners who would like to take advantage of the no-cost private lead service pipe removal program are urged to call the BWSC Lead Hotline for assistance on this or any other lead related issues at (617) 989-7888. Carroll, Distinguished University Professor and Balo-Simon Chair of Biology at the University of Maryland, who has been called "the greatest science storyteller of our time"; Akiko Iwasaki, Sterling Professor of Immunobiology at the Yale University School of Medicine, who researches the mechanisms of immune defense against viruses at mucosal surfaces; and Michel Nischan, a four-time James Beard Award-winning chef and champion of

the farm-to-table concept.

In closing, Clark President David B.
