Greenway to officially be named after the late Mary Ellen Welch

A group of friends, neighbors, residents and family members of the heralded community activist, the late Mary Ellen Welch, have been successful in their efforts to get the East Boston Greenway renamed in her honor.

Since the untimely passing of Welch back in March the Friends of the East Boston Greenway have been circulating a petition around the community asking for the city to rename the park after Welch.

"We wanted to share the good news about the Greenway renaming to the "Mary

Ellen Welch Greenway,' said East Boston Greenway Director Michelle Moon. "The Parks Commissioners approved the Friends (of the Greenway) petition due to the overwhelming support we received from the community."

Several members of the Friends of the Greenway worked on collecting signatures and doing the paperwork over this summer.

"We will be having a dedication, tentatively scheduled in late October (or early November), at the caboose," said Moon. "We have a volunteer landscape

Pazza on Porter to open at former Craft Table Bar

Since the famed Sablone's Veal & Vintage closed decades ago, the restaurant space on Porter Street has gone through several alterations.

First the building housed the widely successful Ecco Martini bar for many years before reopening under new ownership as Craft Ta-

However, while having a loyal following from former Ecco patrons, Craft really never caught on in the neighborhood and the coveted space just outside the mouth of the Callahan Tunnel with tons of parking begged for something new and exciting.

Over the past year local restaurateurs Mivan Spencer and Raffaele Scalzi of the Boston Amici Group leased the space, finished a complete renovation of the restaurant space and carefully crafted a new menu.

Residents in the area have been eagerly anticipating the opening of the new culinary spot that is sure to be a hit with the neighborhood.

Last week Spencer and Scalzi announced the opening of Pazza on Porter on Friday, October 11. The new restaurant will feature an Italian-American menu filled with Italian classics perfect to share, as well as a full bar and patio for outdoor dining.

The duo will also host a soft opening with limited reservations prior to the grand opening on Wednesday, October 9 and Thursday, October 10.

"With Pazza on Porter, we have been able to bring in resources from our other local ventures to elevate the experience for diners," said Spencer. "All of our pastas are sourced from Marblehead's Casa Mia and our coffee and cold brew is Guglielmo, which is exclusive to my family's Caffè Dello Sport in the North

Located in the same

spot as Sablone's, and later Ecco, Pazza on Porter commemorates old Eastie with their private dining room that features the Sablone's signature wall--something Ecco owners preserved when they took over the restaurant. Notable signatures on the wall range from Ted Williams and Bobby Orr to Diana Ross and Ste-

"With the ever-changing landscape of East Boston, Pazza on Porter will pay homage to the old East Boston while bringing something new and exciting to this space, said. "Pazza on Porter is East Boston's newest restaurant with the oldest ties."

As for the food, Pazza's menu was created by Executive Chef, Stephen Ennamorati, previously of Citizen's Public House & Oyster Bar. Ennamorati said he takes Italian-American style cuisine to another level in a creative and delicious way.

"The menu has a focus

on shareable meals, but also includes a full sit-down menu, along with a latenight menu running seven days a week, until 1 a.m.," he said. "Pazza's menu will include classic dishes such as meatballs, calamari, burrata and more. A variety of homemade pastas will be incorporated into dishes like the Amatrciana, Carbonara, and Alla Pazza. For the meat lover, Pazza will feature a rib eye and steak tips. For those looking for something on the lighter side, the pistachio encrusted Salmon

or Haddock Mediterranean is for you."

Pazza's cocktail menu is curated by San Diego native Josue Castillo of Richard Blais' Crack Shack and brings a West Coast feel to each cocktail.

Castillo said the bar will exclusively offer a snack menu with delicious offerings such as zucchini fries and spiedini - steak, chicken, vegetable or shrimp skewers. Pazza's expansive beverage menu will include 20 beer taps, featuring 13 taps of local MA beer, Aperol Spritz, cold brew, red wine, white wine, and rosé, all on draft.

architect, James Kros, who is a Board Member of the Friends. Kros has been researching design elements, trees, flowers, a memorial bench and plaque for the dedication."

For more than a half century, Welch was the steward of social, political and environmental activism in the neighborhood.

Welch, a longtime community activist and school teacher, helped bring a neighborhood with the least amount of open space to a community with award winning sprawling parks and greenways.

Sadly, on Thursday, March 7, Welch passed away after she had battled an illness for several months.

As one of the founding

members of the Friends of the East Boston Greenway, Welch worked for decades to take a neglected stretch of the old Narrow Gauge Railroad and transform it into a system of lush landscaped park so residents could enjoy a stroll from Jeffries Point to Orient Heights. Welch was one of a small

group of Eastie residents who believed the trash filled, abandoned freight tracks could become a welcoming, safe Greenway that would remove years of contamination in the midst of the neighborhood.

In the years that followed the Greenway would become a beautiful green space for children to ride their bikes, seniors to stroll and residents to make connections through and across the neighborhood.

Once officially dedicated by the City of Boston, the section of the Greenway stretching from Marginal to Porter Street will bear Mary Ellen Welch's name.

The Friends of the East Boston Greenway have also established the Mary Ellen Welch Memorial Fund to help raise money for future Greenway improvements and programs.



DONATE BLOOD WITH THE RED CROSS TO HELP THOSE FIGHTING CANCER

During Breast Cancer Awareness Month this October, the American Red Cross urges eligible donors to give blood or platelets to provide hope and healing to patients fighting cancer.

Breast cancer is the second most common cancer in women, and more than 268,000 women are expected to be diagnosed with breast cancer this year.

In August 2016, Myel Bowers-Smith went to the doctor for what she thought was a breast infection for a mosquito bite after a vacation in Cancun. Instead, she received the devastating diagnosis - she had stage 4 inflammatory breast cancer, a very rare and aggressive breast carcinoma. Bowers-Smith, a U.S. Army committed fighting for her life. "Once I began fighting, I knew I had to remain strong," she said. Her aggressive care plan included five different chemotherapy treatments and steroids.

Like many patients with cancer, Bower-Smith needed multiple blood product transfusions. Cancer patients undergoing surgery and chemotherapy may require red blood cell or platelet transfusions. In fact, more than half of all platelets collected by the Red Cross are used by patients with cancer.

After months of grueling treatments, in August 2017, Bowers-Smith celebrated the news that her cancer was in remission. Today, she enjoys sharing her story and encouraging others to be a blessing by donating blood or platelets. "Eligible donors, you have something good – which is your blood. A pint of blood can help save lives."

Donors of all blood types, especially platelet donors and those with type O blood, are needed to ensure a stable supply for cancer patients and others this fall. Appointments can be made by downloading the free Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting Red-CrossBlood.org, calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or enabling the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device.

All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and

other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet do-

nors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive. To get started, follow the instructions at RedCross-Blood.org/RapidPass use the Blood Donor App.

Another way to support the lifesaving mission of the American Red Cross is to become a volunteer transportation specialist and deliver lifesaving blood products to local area hospitals. Volunteer transportation specialists play a very important role in ensuring an ample blood supply for patients in need by transporting blood and blood products. Sicily ... It's Complicated ..., the artists are exploring their origins and how they influence who we are through stories and various places. From physical locations to the world of the invisible and beliefs, we are who we are through our experiences and stories we have heard, created or followed. In their two-person exhibition, Sandrine Colson and Diane Modica, each tell stories about places close to their heart and beliefs by taking you through a journey of imagination or reality depending on the tale being represented under their brush.

For Sandrine, her journey as a painter began from childhood influenced by her grandmother's artistic guidance and continued through various studies, her world travels, native Provence in France and current Boston residence. In her Paris Stories, a series of unique and original pieces of mixed media work tell each a different story about the "city of light." Each piece - represents unique events, memories, words, and accounts of fictional or real people, past events or emotional journeys related to Paris. Each invites the viewer to let his or her imagination decides where the story goes, somewhat guided by the composition

For Modica, this exhibit reflects her continuing search for the connection to her family roots in Sicily. A Boston native, both sets of her grandparents emigrated from Mineo, Sicily to the U.S. in the early 1900's. While one raised its family in Boston and the other in Portland, Maine, the two sides always remained in contact with one another.

As in previous shows, Modica mines the complex and rich history and heritage of her Sicilian roots. Sicily, a strategically located island at the boot of Italy, survived centuries of invaders including Greeks, Romans, Byzantines, Arabs, Normans, Swabians and Spanish all of whom left their mark on the island and its people. Using colorful mixed media including painting, collage, stitching, textiles and writ-

ten text, she finds a visceral

and visual bond between

the past and the present.

after shelter.

The women's stories were similar to other single mothers trying to raise children in the state's shelter system.

"I am the mother of a beautiful, almost 3-year-old daughter," the first speaker began. "We have been living here at Crossroads for about nine months now. To say the least, being here has been an eye-opening experience. To tell you all a little bit about how I ended up here at Crossroads standing before you, I should start by telling you something most of you probably already know, but has been especially true for me: life is unpredictable, unfair, and

at times brutal."

The resident said earlier in her adult life she struggled with drug addiction, even to the point where she was incarcerated.

"Just as I began receiving help and entering recovery, my father passed away," she said. "While dealing with the indescribable pain of losing my father, my boyfriend of four years at the time was murdered. I fell back into drugs and my addiction worsened as I tried to cope with these inexplicable losses. Life at this time proved to be brutal and unfair. But, as they all say, life moves on, and so did I. After entering sobriety a second time, I moved in with my mother and shortly after life once again proved itself to be unfair. My brother passed away, forcing my mother to move into a small one-bedroom apartment. With nowhere left to turn, I decided to move in with my new boyfriend who was staying with his parents. I had only been living there a few short months when I found out I was pregnant with my

daughter."

The resident explained that shortly after her mother fell ill and moved out of her boyfriend's home.

"I never thought I would be put in a position where I would have to enter a shelter with my daughter, but life as I have learned time and again cares little for predictability," she said. "After numerous attempts, I was finally placed by the Department of Housing and Community Development at Crossroads. The journey to get here was trying and at many times unbearable, but life keeps moving. Being at Crossroads has been an awakening experience as I have had to adjust and address the challenges of raising a toddler in a communal setting. Establishing a routine here is in no way easy, but in every way necessary for me and my child. Think bedtime... potty training. Despite the hard times though, she is growing up a happy and thriving little girl. Kids are resilient, and being here at Crossroads, having a stable place to live, allows her to just be

a kid."
While she is still looking for permanent housing, she thanked Crossroads for all that they do and made a plea with elected officials to support anti-homlessness programs.

"Please remember the importance of housing stability for real families like us," she said. "Sometimes life is so unpredictable, and people just need a little help along the way. That's what programs like Crossroads and the Mass Rental Voucher Program (MRVP) are for."

"I needed to enter emergency shelter because of repeated abuse and domestic violence," she said. "I had been in shelter prior to Crossroads. I left and returned to my abuser because I had hope, he convinced me that he wanted to make our family work. I believed he had changed and that he would no longer physically or verbally abuse me anymore. That wasn't true or real and the reality was devastating. The person meant to keep us safe was dangerous and I could no longer trust that

So she fled with her children again just days before she found out she was expecting her now four-month old daughter.

he wouldn't hurt us."

"For the first two months after leaving the father of my children, I bounced from house to house because I didn't know where to turn," she said. "My abuser was all I knew and the only support I had."

She was eventually placed at Crossroads.

"Being back in a shelter has really taken a toll on me emotionally more than anything, and yet I'm also very grateful because I don't know where I would I be if places like Crossroads were not around," she said. "I gave birth to my youngest daughter while living here. I have a lot of goals. As a parent, it's natural to have hopes and dreams for yourself and children, but before I can fulfill those we need to be housed. I'm determined to give my children a home so that they feel stable and we can build a life. Please remember to fund MRVP as if it was the key to solving family homelessness. Please always remember to support places like Crossroads Shelter that gave me a place to celebrate what joys we do have as a family. Please remember that housing instability is a community issue, it affects the moms dropping off kids at school, the people riding the T with you, the people

who you see every day."

After the speeches both Rep. Madaro and Speaker DeLeo commented that the two residents' stories are exactly what they repeat to colleagues when lobbying for increased funding for the MRVP program and homeless shelters like

Crossroads.
