# OHNC split on restaurant proposal at Monday's meeting

its monthly During meeting on Monday, the Orient Heights Neighborhood Council (OHNC) held a vote on a new Taqueria Jalisco restaurant location at 980 Saratoga Street, which is seeking a liquor license and is proposing to close at 1:00 a.m., which ended in a tie.

According to Attorney Ryan Gazda, the abovementioned restaurant is planned to be "a new full-service restaurant, serving authentic Mexican cuisine."

Moreover, he explained that the restaurant space is comprised of about 2,500 square feet and would have 75 indoor seats.

"My clients own and operate the existing Taqueria Jalisco at 291 Bennington Street, which they have operated successfully for approximately 20 years since 2004, and they're now excited for the opportunity to open a sister restaurant here in Orient Heights," said Gazda.

Gazda also indicated that the plan is for the

restaurant to be open for seven days and expanded on the proposed closure time. Gazda referred to the 1:00 a.m. closing as "aspirational" and that he guessed that on slower nights, the restaurant would close much earlier.

He also emphasized that this establishment is "restaurant-forward" compared to others in the area with late closing times and indicated that the floor plans only contain seven counter-bar seats. Moreover, there are no plans for live entertainment.

Regarding the next steps, Gazda indicated that they have filed an application with the licensing board but have not been scheduled for a hearing yet. He anticipates that the hearing will be scheduled

sometime in July. "This is all strictly aspirational based upon what the state might do with the pending legislation, but the hope here is that licenses will come into East Boston and that Taqueria Jalisco, who has been a

# Water Quality **Report Card**

Boston Harbor's water, including Constitution Beach, was once again ranked among the safest in the country for beachgoers

Save the Harbor/Save the Bay released their 2023 Beach Season Water Quality Report Card at a press conference with Democratic Whip Congresswoman Katherine Clark, DCR Commissioner Brian Arrigo, and other local and state leaders at Revere Beach last week.

This year's report card used data from the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) to survey the water quality of each of the region's public beaches in Lynn, Nahant, Revere,

Winthrop, East Boston, South Boston, Dorchester, Quincy and Hull.

2023 was the rainiest summer in the Boston area since 1955, resulting in an overall water quality safety rating of 85% for

the Boston Harbor area beaches, down from the previous dry year's 93%

In East Boston, Constitution Beach saw its overall rating drop to 88 percent from 97 percent in the 2022 dry year. The sixyear average safety rating for Constitution Beach still has it with a healthy 93 percent safety rating.

"With temperatures expected to reach an alltime high this summer, it is essential that our urban beaches remain safe, clean, and accessible for families and residents to cool down and have fun,' said East Boston State Representative Madaro. "An increase in our overall water quality safety rating reflects our ongoing commitment to

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#### GET READY FOR THE HEAT

With the weatherman forecasting the first heat wave of the season for our region this week, all of us should take precautions to ensure that we do not fall victim to heat stroke or other heat-related stress to our bodies.

A heat wave officially comprises three straight days of 90+ temperatures and forecasters are telling us that we could have four 90+ days with little relief at night. Our readers may be surprised to learn that more than 1200 Americans die every year from extreme heat, making heat the deadliest kind of extreme weather. By contrast, flooding, though more sensational when viewed on our TV screens, kills fewer than 100 Americans each year. In addition, it is widely believed that those 1200 deaths are a significant undercount because persons with health issues who succumb to heat may not have been deemed to have died from heat.

Although senior citizens and those with underlying health conditions are the most susceptible to the dangers of excessive heat, even young and healthy individuals can succumb to heat stroke if they do not take it easy. With our region plunging from typically cool, spring weather right into the heat, those who work outside (or who work out on a daily basis) have not had time to adjust, both mentally and physically, to the onset of the extreme heat.

However, we are not the only ones facing extreme heat these days. Extreme heat is a world-wide phenomenon thanks to the effects of climate change. Heat records have been set in recent days across the globe, from Greece to India to the Philippines. Every month for the past 12 months has set a world record for that month (in other words, May was the hottest-ever May, April the hottest-ever April, etc.) and June is on track to make it 13 months in a row (which means that this June will break last June's record for the hottest-ever June).

The National Weather Service is providing a new way to gauge the risk from extreme heat. In collaboration with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, it has launched a tool called HeatRisk which allows users to search a map of the United States to figure out their level of threat, ranging between one (little to no risk) and four (extreme risk).

For those of us lucky enough to live near the coastline, a dip in the ocean will offer a respite from the heat wave. But those of us who have sampled the ocean in the past few weeks have noticed another ominous sign of climate change -- the water temperature already has been far above normal. Instead of the extremity-chilling temps that are typical for May and early June, the water temp at the beaches around Boston Harbor actually has been pleasant. So the good news is that it's been warm enough to go for a swim -- but the bad news is that the record high ocean temps are a threat to all marine life and a major contributor to rising sea levels.

Finally, the combination of the hot atmosphere and the hot ocean increases the chances of extreme weather events such as hurricanes and inundating rainfall, which is occurring in southern Florida right now.

We urge all of our readers not to underestimate the effects of extreme heat and to take it easy over the next few days.

# BANNER NO. 18!

The Celtics' convincing victory in Game 5 on Monday that clinched the Celts' 18th NBA championship was great fun for fans old and young alike.

For those of us who cherish our "Havlicek Stole the Ball" album and who recall watching the Bill Russell-led Celts clinch their 1969 NBA title in Game 7 at Los Angeles in dramatic fashion (we had to stay up late on a school night because the game was played on the West Coast), the chance to surpass the hated-Lakers for the most NBA titles was one of the most-satisfying aspects of the 2024 title.

In addition, this edition of the Celtics laid to rest whether they had that special quality that separates champions from the rest of the pack. After the disappointment of being knocked out in the first round last year, and the collapse against Golden State in the finals two years ago, even the most-ardent Celtic fans had to wonder whether JT, JB, & Co. had what it takes to be the best -- and they answered that question in commanding fashion.

Still, when we consider that this was the Celtics' first title in 16 years and only the second in almost 40 years, it makes us realize how special these championship moments are in the world of sports today. By contrast, the Celtics won 16 NBA titles over a 30-year span from 1957 to 1986. That's more than half of the NBA crowns spanning two generations of Boston sports fans.

But those days when Bill, Dave, and Larry ruled the NBA are long gone. The NBA is big business now -- the extended playoffs literally are a second season -- and attracts the best players from all over the world. The post-game commentators noted that there are more excellent teams who will be shooting to knock off the Celtics than at any time in the history of the NBA. As good as this talented young group may be, we cannot expect that they can create the sort of dynasties that marked the

Celtics' teams of the '50s, '60s, '70s, and '80s. So let's savor the moment -- and get ready for a joy-

ous victory parade!

member of the community here for 20 years, is a deserving applicant," said Gazda.

"They have a proven track record as a responsible operator, and of course, they would love to have your support as we move forward.'

After Gazda's presentation, the floor was open to questions and comments. One resident asked if they would still move forward with plans without the liquor license, to which Gazda said yes.

Another resident who welcomed the restaurant in the neighborhood pushed back on the proposed 1:00 a.m. closing time out of fears that it might entice

the applicants to come back to the neighborhood for live entertainment, noise issues, and more. Gazda acknowledged the concerns and added,

"We're trying to be in

line with what's present

now in the community to also remain economically competitive with the other restaurants in the area to give them a fair shot."

Another resident raised concerns about the 1:00 a.m. closing time, and Gazda indicated that the owners are willing to work with the community to potentially come to a compromise if that is a hurdle.

An attendee asked if the owners' other restaurant had a liquor license, to which Gazda said no. He was also asked if the other location would stay open, to which Gazda said yes.

Several other comments were made about the proposal. Ultimately, the OHNC did not reach a majority position in opposition or support, as the vote ended 8-8, with one

voter abstaining. The next


of the National Anthem by Gabriel Rosa and the Pledge of Alledgiance to the Flag led by Dave Arinella '70 who acted as master of ceremonies.





Despite the frequent heavy rainstorms, Constitution Beach remained one of nine area beaches that scored over 88 percent this year, with South Boston's beaches once again defending their title as the cleanest urban beaches in the country. "Even amid all the eco-

logical challenges of last year's historic rainfall, our beaches were able to persevere and continue welcoming visitors," said Clark. "That resilience was a policy choice — the result of transformational investments in Boston Harbor. Now, we have

to make another choice:

mobilizing unprecedented action to brace these treasures against the impacts of climate change.

"That's why I'm fighting every day to bring home our share of the historic climate investments we've enacted under President Biden." Save the Harbor hopes

their annual report card makes it easy to understand how safe and clean these places are, even as they work to address the effect of sea level rise on recreational beaches

and the impact of increasing storms on water

quality in some areas. The dizzying amount of precipitation amplifies the significant effort still

required to raise the stan-

dard on some beaches like King's Beach in Lynn, which scored a record low of 55% in the wet season.

"King's Beach is an outlier in the Boston area,' said Save the Harbor Executive Director Chris Mancini. "It's a difficult and complex infrastructure challenge that has required dozens of meetings between stakeholders at every level of community and government. We're very lucky to have such a committed, collaborative group from Lynn, Swampscott, the state and the federal government focused on trying to turn this beach

Arrigo said the DCR

is committed to ensuring

the beaches are safe, clean

and swimmable spaces for families and residents to cool down at.

"Despite last year's record rainfall, our Metro Boston beaches continue to be some of the cleanest in the country," said Arrigo. "Throughout the summer, DCR conducts regular water quality testing at all of our waterfronts, and we work diligently with our partners at the Department of Public Health to post the results to our website and Park Alerts Page as quickly as possible. We're grateful to our partners like Save the Harbor and the legislators on the Metro Beaches Commission for their support in ensuring our beaches

are welcoming places and

our residents have clean water for recreation."

Save the Harbor Deputy Director Kristen Barry noted that in urban infrastructure, an inch of rain can quickly flush out bacteria that builds up in drains and stormwater pipes, making some days where it is unsafe to swim.

"That bacteria is the main public health concern - the good news is we have a 9-foot tide cycle twice a day and within 24 hours our beaches are again as clean as ever," said Barry.

Currently the beaches use a posting and flagging system to alert the public to high bacteria levels. But

the best technology avail-

able takes 24 hours to re-

turn results, meaning by the time the posting goes up, the information is already out of date.

"Until technology can catch up, our best advice is to follow the 24-hour rule and simply wait a day after a significant rainfall before returning to water," said Mancini. "Except in South Boston where you can swim every day of the year. In the meantime, the Report Card has been a great tool to show the great overall quality of our urban beaches. We hope it will give people the confidence to get out and enjoy our spectacular state beaches."

# **BPDA Board approves** 9 Geneva Street Project

During a meeting last week, the Boston Planning & Development Agency's (BPDA) Board approved a project to bring several

units to 9 Geneva Street. According to Daniel Polanco, a Project Manager with the BPDA, the project involves constructing a five-story residential building with 28 units, five of which are inclusionary development policy (IDP) units. It is also slated to have a maximum of 16 parking spaces and a minimum of 34 interior bike spaces.

"The proposed project will provide community benefits for the East Boston neighborhood in the City of Boston and will result in improving the pedestrian experience along Geneva Street with the installation of new sidewalks, street trees, landscaping, and visitor bike parking," said Polanco.

After Polanco introduced the project, Ilana Haimes, a Zoning Compliance Planner at the BPDA, outlined its planning con-

Haimes indicated that the project is situated in the East Boston Residential (EBR)-4 zoning subdistrict under new zoning, which the Boston Zoning Com-

mission adopted in April.

As previously noted,

Polanco indicated that the developing the project with building's height was five stories, and in the EBR-4 subdistrict, the maximum number of stories is four. However, Haimes described the height of the building as four stories above the design flood elevation.

"The proposed project is located in the coastal flood resilience overlay district, which requires new construction to meet resilient design standards," said Haimes.

"These standards include elevating the building above the base flood elevation for the year 2070 and limiting the uses that can be located below the design flood elevation."

She later added that the proposed height of four stories above the design flood elevation was consistent with zoning. It should also be noted

that Haimes indicated that the project would need zoning relief for building width, the rear setback, and the maximum floor plate. She also mentioned that relief is recommended for the rear setback because of the lot's irregular shape.

Shortly after Haimes' presentation, Attorney Richard Lynds outlined a brief presentation of the project. Lynds indicated that over the last 18 and

a half months, the project

team has been hard at work

entities like the BPDA and Gove Street Citizens Association.

"I think people are pretty happy to see this project move forward," said Lynds, who indicated that the project would involve the demolition of an auto repair facility that has been at the site for more than 60 years, which he described as an eyesore.

As his presentation progressed, Lynds walked through some photos of the site and reiterated that the project team would cooperate with other developers on Geneva Street to improve the roadway.

Moreover, Lynds also indicated that a courtyard consisting of around 5,000 square feet of open space will be included in the rear of the building.

To wrap up the presentation, Donnie Garrity from O'Sullivan Architects walked through other plans, elevations, and features, including a dog park, the building being all-electric, and more, before the project went to a vote. The Board's Chair, Pris-

cilla Rojas, was the only member who commented or asked a question about the project. She complimented the dog park and backyard amenity space. Ultimately, the Board unanimously approved the

project.

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# La Esquina Verde coming soon to Maverick Street

La Esquina Verde, "a new food venture in East Boston," is set to come to the building at 389 Maverick Street, the site of the former Tawakal Halal Cafe, according to Mónica Leitner-Laserna, who presented plans for the establishment at Monday's Jeffries Point Neighborhood Association (JPNA)

"We're really a local food hub focused on sustainable practices," said Leitner-Laserna, who is taking on this endeavor with her business partner Ricardo Monroy. "La Esquina Verde in English is the green corner, so we're right on the corner of Jeffries and Maverick; we are going to be painting it

As part of the plans, the establishment is set to offer cooking classes, catering and meal plans, and events. There are plans for public and private events along with pop-up chefs.

For example, one of the public events Leitner-Laserna outlined was Public Kitchen, a program from the Design Studio For Social Intervention, a group based in Dorchester.

Currently, Leitner-Laserna hopes to open in mid-July. The plan is to use the space from around 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.

"We are hoping to use the space as much as possible because we really want it to be a space for the community, for pop-up chefs, for people who are interested in doing events, so we're saying about 5-7 days a week," she said.

Moreover, improvements and slight renovations are taking place. However, Leitner-Laserna indicated they are not changing the building's layout. "We're saying it's a development project, but it actually right now is really just a new use of the space for this business."

co-founder. Further, a portion of La Esquina Verde's profits will go toward local non-profits and initiatives, and the establishment will promote and educate sustainable practices.

It should be noted that Leitner-Laserna and Monroy have a wealth of experience they can share with the community. Both have teaching experience, as Leitner-Laserna has been a teacher for 15 years, and Monroy is a culinary arts

Moreover, both have a connection to Haley House, a non-profit in Roxbury that features a program called Take Back the Kitchen, which offers affordable and bilingual cooking classes. Leitner-Laserna has ties to several other establishments, like Eastie Farm, as previously mentioned.

After the presentation, Leitner-Laserna questions from those in attendnace. Josh Schmidt, a JPNA Board Member, had asked about the establishment's potential collaboration with Eastie Farm and its CSA (Community Supported Agriculture).

Eastie Farm's CSA allows residents to sign up for and purchase shares containing a weekly supply of fresh produce from local farms and the organi-

While Leitner-Laserna indicated they are still working out the details, she theorized that patrons might get a discount on La Esquina Verde classes if they are CSA members and that there may be special events for CSA mem-

Another attendee asked if there would be food for sale, to which Leitner-Laserna said yes and emphasized it would probably be "an open-fridge grab-and-go situation." She also indicated that people can sign up for meal plans, which she said is basically picking up a whole week's worth of food.



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# Massachusetts House passes bill to prevent opioid-related overdose deaths

Massachusetts House of Representatives passed a wide-ranging opioid bill which covers the licensure of recovery coaches, makes opioid overdose reversal drugs more accessible, protects harm reduction providers, and removes barriers that new mothers in recovery face at the time they give birth.

"As families across Massachusetts know all too well, the impact of opioid addiction can be utterly devastating for the individual and for their loved ones, which is why a continued focus on combating substance use is a critical responsibility that we have as elected officials," said House Speaker Ronald J. Mariano (D-Quincy). "I want to thank Chairman Michlewitz and Chairman Madaro for their tireless work on this legislation, as well as all my colleagues in the House for recognizing the need for reforms that will help those dealing with addiction on their journey to recovery."

"This legislation will help the Commonwealth to address the opioid epidemic by expanding treatment options and by making it easier for those in need to seek assistance," said Representative Aaron Michlewitz (D-Boston), Chair of the House Committee on Ways & Means. "By making treatment options more accessible and by removing barriers for thousands of people seeking help, we can help people rebuild their lives and stay on the road to recovery. I want to thank Speaker Mariano for his commitment and dedication to this issue, as well as Chairman Madaro, and all my House colleagues for their work and dedication to addressing substance use disorder."

"The bill passed today builds on the commitment of the House to support individuals and communities across the Commonwealth who are dealing with the effects of the opioid crisis," said Representative Adrian C. Madaro (D-East Boston), House Chair of the Joint Committee on Mental Health, Substance Use and Recovery. "By ensuring greater access to overdose reversal drugs, protecting harm reduction workers, removing barriers to mothers in recovery, and licensing recovery coaches, we are empowering health care providers, community members, and individuals to save lives. Thank you to Speaker Mariano for your leadership and guidance on this issue, and to Chair Michlewitz for your partnership in passing this critical legislation."

In 2023, there were 2,125 confirmed and estimated opioid-related overdose deaths, according to the latest data published by the Department of Public Health (DPH). In 2023, there were 232 fewer confirmed and estimated deaths than 2022.

### **Recovery coaches**

Recovery coaches help people with substance use needs become and stay engaged in their recovery process. The bill passed today establishes recovery coach licensing and oversight within DPH, and mandates that all health plans cover recovery coach services without cost-sharing or prior authorization. The bill also directs the Bureau of Substance Addiction Services (BSAS) to study and report on barriers to certification, credentialing, and other employment and practice requirements for recovery coaches, and requires them to create a

peer support program for recovery coaches consisting of mentorship, technical assistance on billing and employment practices, and resources.

"This marks a pivotal moment for our community and for those battling substance use disorders, said Representative Jim O'Day (D-West Boylston), Fourth Division Chair and lead sponsor of the bill. "With the passage of H. 4743, we are taking significant steps to enhance treatment options, expand coverage, and, crucially, to recognize the indispensable role of recovery coaches. This legislation builds on our historical commitment to reducing stigma and procomprehensive support for individuals in recovery. By embracing harm reduction strategies, patient education, and compassionate care, we are advancing public health and offering renewed hope to those affected by substance use disorders. Together, we are forging a path towards a healthier, more supportive future for all. Let us stand proud of this achievement and continue to champion

plans cover opioid overreversal such as naloxone, without cost-sharing or prior authorization. It also requires substance use disorder treatment facilities to educate on and dispense at least two doses of opioid overdose reversal drugs to an individual upon discharge, as well as requires hospitals to educate on and prescribe or dispense at least two doses of opioid overdose reversal drugs to an individual with a history of opioid use or opioid use disorder upon discharge.

It also requires pharmacies in areas with high incidence of overdose to maintain a continuous supply of opioid overdose reversal drugs and to report to DPH if they are unable to maintain compliance with this provision due to insufficient stock or supply.

#### **Patient education**

In an effort to prevent opioid misuse, the bill requires prescribers to be educated on pain treatment, including appropriate non-opioid alternatives to pain treatment. It also requires pharmacists to provide printed educational materials issued by DPH on non-opioid alternatives for the treatment of pain to patients prior to dispensing an opioid.

#### Harm reduction

The bill protects public health or harm reduction organizations and their agents who provide drug-checking services, such as needle exchange programs, to reduce the risk of accidental overdose from civil liability or professional disciplinary action from a board of registration, as well as from being criminally charged or prosecuted for possession of drug paraphernalia, unlawful possession of controlled substances, and conspiracy to violate the Controlled Substances Act (the CSA).

It also protects individuals who seek drug-checking services on substances intended only for personal use from being criminally charged or prosecuted for possession of drug paraphernalia, unlawful possession of controlled substances, and conspiracy to violate the CSA while on the premises of a public health or harm reduction providing organization said services.

#### Ensuring non-discriminatory treatment

The bill clarifies DPH's authority to enforce anti-discrimination protections for people with substance use disorder who are on public health insur-

ance. It also prohibits life insurance companies from limiting or refusing coverage to individuals solely because they obtained an opioid overdose reversal drug for themselves or others. It also prohibits discrimination on the basis of lawful possession and use of a medication for the treatment of an opioid-related substance use disorder, such as methadone or buprenorphine.

#### Pregnant people on medications for addiction treatment

The bill passed today removes "physical dependence upon an addictive drug at birth" from the conditions necessitating a child abuse and neglect report, thereby exempting pregnant people taking medications prescribed by their doctor from automatic investigation by the Department of Children and Families (DCF). It requires DCF, in consultation with DPH, the Office of the Child Advocate (OCA), and stakeholders, to promulgate regulations on the care, treatment, and reporting of substance-ex-

Having passed the House of Representatives 153-0, the bill now goes to the Senate for its consider-

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
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#### **BOCCE AND BISCOTTI NIGHT**
